



"The Opportunity School"


I would first like to thank Mr. Bennett and the TCS Board for the promotion to Dean of Students. I would also like to thank my amazing colleagues and the students of TCS for helping me consistently feel like a valued member of the community.

I recall first arriving at TCS. I couldn't believe this cozy building was a real school! It was a welcomed change from my previous placement and I knew I had to work here. As I interviewed and toured the building, one word kept popping into my mind: *opportunity*. I saw (and still see) TCS as a unique opportunity to make a difference in students' lives.

On the first day of school, I facilitate an activity that involves me making a statement, followed by students and staff demonstrating their response by walking to a section of the APR labeled, "Yes/Always," "No/Never", or "Maybe/Sometimes". Discussions and explanations usually ensue, but the main goal of the activity is to recognize some of the things we have in common, along with differences- all without saying a word.





Mrs. Griffith's English Classes:

It feels like a long time ago that we were canoeing down the Brandywine in June. What a fun day! The kids navigated rocks and brush, worked with a partner to steer and stay afloat, and overcame discomfort proving to themselves that they can do hard things! For many kids, canoeing was a first-time experience; I can say we all had a great time!

I am so happy to be back to this small learning community. I missed my students over the summer! I love to read, and I love teaching at TCS, so I thought it would be cool to have a school-wide book club. Teachers, staff, and students were all gifted the novel-in-verse *The Do More Club*



written by my National Writing Project Fellow, Dana Kramaroff. To launch the book, we gathered as a whole community enjoying fun, team building activities in the APR in which students came to the conclusion that we are all more alike than we are different! In individual English classes, students are delving into non-fiction articles about the hate crime that occurred just down the street from our school at FarmerJawn's (which many of our kids visited on a school field trip or pass by in their buses). This incident, sadly and coincidentally, ties into the initiating incident of our novel.

Thanks to Mr. Bennett for purchasing a book for each student to put on their personal bookshelf as a powerful reminder of the lessons we will be learning as a whole school! Showing kindness trumps hate!





Mrs. Culler's Classes:

Mrs. Culler's Anatomy and Life Science Classes are starting off the year learning about the smallest units of life, the cells. This week, we had fun examining cells of plants, animals, and even cells from the students under microscopes. Students are looking forward to making edible cell models in class in the upcoming weeks!

Mrs. Culler's History classes are exploring American history in AP US History and 20th Century American History. Students in AP History are working on analyzing primary sources and historical documents as they learn to answer Document-Based Questions. Students in 20th Century American History are learning about the industrialization of America and how we are still feeling the impacts of it today.



Mrs. Frederick's Classes:

Mrs. Fredericks's **Pixar class** is learning about creating stories for animation. We've talked about movies and animations that they like and what characters and worlds they live in. We've taken apart those stories and switched out characters and worlds to see what would happen, "What if..." We've examined Pixar trailers and shorts to see what makes them good stories. Special thanks to Mr. Schullery for sharing his expertise in film production and story creation and helping our students!

Mrs. Fredericks's **3D** printing class consists of students in 3D Printing 1 and students in 3D Printing 2 (those students who have had 3D printing 1). The students in 3D Printing 1 are learning how to use Tinkercad and how to start creating projects. Students in 3D Printing 2 are doing a

refresher in 3D printing and will soon switch to a more advanced program, "Autodesk Fusion 360."











Mrs. Fredericks's **Photograhy class** is learning the camera. They learned about the parts of the camera, how to shoot, how to zoom in and out, how to change lenses, and how to upload to Google drive. We will next learn about the Exposure Triangle: Aperture, Shutter Priority, and ISO.

Mrs. Fredericks's Video Editing class became stars of the school this week. They created movie trailers in iMovie based on The American Film Institute's "The Door." We





had two groups, Emmy & Lilith and Colin & Gavin. Each group wrote their own stories centered around a door. They created a storyboard, recorded and edited the video. They were shown to the school during our Morning Meeting. Both videos were a hit! Special thanks to Mr. Schullery for sharing his expertise in Film Production and helping our students!

Mr. Burtch's Classes:





The new school year has begun. Students are studying math topics ranging from Basic Math and Pre-Algebra, through Algebra 1 and 2,

Geometry to Trigonometry and Calculus. Students are off to a good start! Almost a dozen bottles of delicious, natural fruit flavored Jarritos have been awarded for excellence in math.

As a reminder, Mr. Burtch's students can win their choice of Jarritos for earning 94% or above (A or A+), on graded math

assignments with assistance. Each winner also has their photo taken with Jasper ("Math Dog") who oversees the award ceremony.
















Mr. Burtch & Ms. Tilmon's Classic Film Class:


